Region 4: Healthcare Pathways

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Education-Based Pathways (High Schools, Colleges, Workforce Training)

Introduction:

Region 4 offers a comprehensive range of education-based healthcare training programs that prepare students and adult learners for in-demand roles across the healthcare continuum.

Registered Nurse (RN) pathways are the most robust across the region, beginning with Associate Degrees in Nursing (ADN) at Reynolds and Brightpoint Community Colleges, and extending through Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) programs at Virginia Commonwealth University (VCU) and Bon Secours Memorial College of Nursing. VSU offers an online RN-to-BSN pathway for working professionals. Galen College and Bryant & Stratton College provide additional RN pathways, often on accelerated or flexible schedules. Many of these programs are Board of Nursing accredited, include clinical rotations, and offer hybrid or evening options to accommodate adult learners.

High school seniors can enter Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN) training through Henrico County's two-year practical nursing program. At the community college level, LPN pathways have historically been offered at Brightpoint and may be supported by FastForward and G3 tuition programs. Galen College also offers LPN training on a flexible schedule, appealing to working adults or career switchers.

Short-term Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) training is delivered through the Community College Workforce Alliance (CCWA) and supported by state-funded tuition programs such as G3 and FastForward. These programs are structured to accommodate working adults with options like evening courses and flexible scheduling.

Medical Assistant (MA) training is available through the Community College Workforce Alliance (CCWA) in partnership with VCU Health, with both daytime and evening classes. The private institution Bryant & Stratton College also offer MA programs, often with flexible and online options. MA roles serve as a valuable workforce entry point and are particularly aligned with adult learners pursuing quick-to-employment credentials.

Reynolds Community College offers a Commission on Dental Accreditation (CODA) certificate in Dental Assisting that includes over 300 clinical hours. Dental Hygiene training is available through VCU's School of Dentistry, which operates a 2+2 program culminating in a bachelor's degree. These pathways are largely campus-based and designed for students pursuing careers in oral health support roles.

Graduate nursing programs at VCU prepare students for roles such as Nurse Practitioner or Nurse Anesthetist. The university also offers training in radiologic technology, occupational therapy, and other advanced allied health fields. These programs are primarily full-time and inperson, though some graduate-level coursework is offered in hybrid formats.

Apprenticeship Mention:

• Community Health Worker (CHW) Apprenticeship: Region 4 has been innovative in adopting apprenticeships for emerging health roles. The *Richmond City Health District* (RHHD) in partnership with VCU Health launched a CHW apprenticeship program – a 10–12 month paid placement for graduates of a CHW training course (vdh.virginia.gov). In this program, community members complete an 8-week training in core public health skills and then apprentice with a local community-based organization to gain experience while earning a stipend. This model both creates new CHWs (who often work in underserved neighborhoods as liaisons and health educators) and provides an avenue for nontraditional entrants (no degree required) to start a healthcare career. The apprenticeship is supported by grant funding (HRSA, state funds) and requires host organizations to commit to mentoring the apprentice and ideally sustaining a CHW position afterward.

Support Mechanisms

Public-sector agencies and community organizations in Region 4 provide additional layers of support to make these programs/pathways accessible, especially to nontraditional learners, working adults, and rural residents:

- Training Assistance: Virginia's FastForward program and G3 ("Get Skilled, Get a Job, Give Back") initiative are important to the healthcare workforce. FastForward underwrites 2/3rds of the tuition for short-term credential courses at community colleges in fields like healthcare (<u>fastforwardva.org</u>). Specifically, this includes CNA, MA, and Dental Assisting. The G3 program, launched in 2021, covers tuition, fees, and even some living expenses for low-to-moderate income Virginians pursuing high-demand fields, including healthcare, at community colleges (<u>reynolds.edu</u>). Many Region 4 students have used G3 to complete CNA or nursing programs with minimal cost.
- Workforce Development Boards: Region 4 is served by workforce boards (Virginia Career Works Capital Area and Crater Area) that administer federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) funds (<u>WIOA State Plan</u>). Eligible individuals can receive Individual Training Accounts (or vouchers) to pay for approved programs like medical assistant or LPN courses, and can get supportive services like transportation assistance and childcare stipends while in training. The Development Boards also have opportunities to search for and directly apply for scholarship opportunities (<u>VAWC.Virginia.gov</u>).
- Regional Events: Stakeholders in Region 4 hold events to share best practices. The Claude Moore Foundation sponsors an annual Healthcare Workforce Summit that gathers schools, employers, and policymakers to discuss pipeline development and actively network for positions. The Virginia Hospital & Healthcare Association (VHHA) has

convened statewide workforce conferences focusing on strategies like apprenticeship, retention, and diversifying the talent pool. And recently, a GO Virginia-funded planning effort led by George Mason University has created the Health Talent Regional Partnership in Region 4, which is bringing together at least two stakeholders from each sector (employers, educators, government, nonprofits, and community members) to map out comprehensive workforce strategies.
